

# House Bill 2304

Introduced and printed pursuant to House Rule 12.00. Pre-session filed (at the request of Governor Kate Brown for Oregon Health Authority)

## SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure **as introduced**.

Adds peer support specialist, family support specialist and youth support specialist to membership of Traditional Health Workers Commission. Modifies definition of "peer support specialist" and "peer wellness specialist," and adds definitions for "family support specialist" and "youth support specialist." Requires coordinated care organizations to ensure members have access to peer support specialists. Authorizes Oregon Health Authority to adopt qualification criteria for traditional health workers utilized by coordinated care organizations.

## A BILL FOR AN ACT

2 Relating to traditional health workers; amending ORS 413.600, 414.025, 414.635, 414.665, 414.736,  
3 414.740 and 443.004.

4 **Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:**

5 **SECTION 1.** ORS 413.600 is amended to read:

6 413.600. (1) There is established within the Oregon Health Authority the Traditional Health  
7 Workers Commission.

8 (2) The Director of the Oregon Health Authority shall appoint the following 19 members to serve  
9 on the commission:

10 (a) Ten members, at least six of whom must be appointed from nominees provided by the Oregon  
11 Community Health Workers Association, who represent traditional health workers, including at  
12 least one member to represent each of the following:

13 (A) Community health workers, **as defined in ORS 414.025;**

14 (B) Personal health navigators, **as defined in ORS 414.025;**

15 (C) Peer wellness specialists, **including family support specialists and youth support spe-**  
16 **cialists, all as defined in ORS 414.025; [and]**

17 **(D) Peer support specialists, including family support specialists and youth support spe-**  
18 **cialists, all as defined in ORS 414.025; and**

19 *[(D)]* **(E) Doulas;**

20 (b) One member who represents the Office of Community Colleges and Workforce Development;

21 (c) One member who is a community health nurse who represents the Oregon Nurses Associ-  
22 ation;

23 (d) One member who is a physician who represents the Oregon Medical Association;

24 (e) One member selected from nominees provided by the Home Care Commission;

25 (f) One member who represents coordinated care organizations;

26 (g) One member who represents a labor organization;

27 (h) One member who supervises traditional health workers at a community-based organization,  
28 local health department, as defined in ORS 433.235, or agency, as defined in ORS 183.310;

**NOTE:** Matter in **boldfaced** type in an amended section is new; matter *[italic and bracketed]* is existing law to be omitted. New sections are in **boldfaced** type.

1 (i) One member who represents community-based organizations or agencies, as defined in ORS  
2 183.310, that provide for the training of traditional health workers; and

3 (j) One member who represents a consumer of services provided by health workers who are not  
4 licensed by this state.

5 (3) In appointing members under subsection (2) of this section, the director shall consider  
6 whether the composition of the Traditional Health Workers Commission represents the geographic,  
7 ethnic, gender, racial, disability status, gender identity, sexual orientation and economic diversity  
8 of traditional health workers.

9 (4) The term of office of each member of the commission is three years, but a member serves  
10 at the pleasure of the director. Before the expiration of the term of a member, the director shall  
11 appoint a successor whose term begins on January 1 next following. A member is eligible for re-  
12 appointment. If there is a vacancy for any cause, the director shall make an appointment to become  
13 immediately effective for the unexpired term.

14 (5) A majority of the members of the commission constitutes a quorum for the transaction of  
15 business.

16 (6) Official action by the commission requires the approval of a majority of the members of the  
17 commission.

18 (7) The commission shall elect one of its members to serve as chairperson.

19 (8) The commission shall meet at times and places specified by the call of the chairperson or  
20 of a majority of the members of the commission.

21 (9) The commission may adopt rules necessary for the operation of the commission.

22 (10) A member of the commission is entitled to compensation and expenses as provided in ORS  
23 292.495.

24 **SECTION 2.** ORS 414.025 is amended to read:

25 414.025. As used in this chapter and ORS chapters 411 and 413, unless the context or a specially  
26 applicable statutory definition requires otherwise:

27 (1)(a) “Alternative payment methodology” means a payment other than a fee-for-services pay-  
28 ment, used by coordinated care organizations as compensation for the provision of integrated and  
29 coordinated health care and services.

30 (b) “Alternative payment methodology” includes, but is not limited to:

45 (3) “Behavioral health home” means a mental health disorder or substance use disorder treat-

1 ment organization, as defined by the Oregon Health Authority by rule, that provides integrated  
 2 health care to individuals whose primary diagnoses are mental health disorders or substance use  
 3 disorders.

4 (4) “Category of aid” means assistance provided by the Oregon Supplemental Income Program,  
 5 aid granted under ORS 411.877 to 411.896 and 412.001 to 412.069 or federal Supplemental Security  
 6 Income payments.

7 (5) “Community health worker” means an individual **who meets qualification criteria adopted**  
 8 **by the authority under ORS 414.665 and** who:

9 (a) Has expertise or experience in public health;

10 (b) Works in an urban or rural community, either for pay or as a volunteer in association with  
 11 a local health care system;

12 (c) To the extent practicable, shares ethnicity, language, socioeconomic status and life experi-  
 13 ences with the residents of the community where the worker serves;

14 (d) Assists members of the community to improve their health and increases the capacity of the  
 15 community to meet the health care needs of its residents and achieve wellness;

16 (e) Provides health education and information that is culturally appropriate to the individuals  
 17 being served;

18 (f) Assists community residents in receiving the care they need;

19 (g) May give peer counseling and guidance on health behaviors; and

20 (h) May provide direct services such as first aid or blood pressure screening.

21 (6) “Coordinated care organization” means an organization meeting criteria adopted by the  
 22 Oregon Health Authority under ORS 414.625.

23 (7) “Dually eligible for Medicare and Medicaid” means, with respect to eligibility for enrollment  
 24 in a coordinated care organization, that an individual is eligible for health services funded by Title  
 25 XIX of the Social Security Act and is:

26 (a) Eligible for or enrolled in Part A of Title XVIII of the Social Security Act; or

27 (b) Enrolled in Part B of Title XVIII of the Social Security Act.

28 **(8)(a) “Family support specialist” means an individual who meets qualification criteria**  
 29 **adopted by the authority under ORS 414.665 and who provides supportive services to and has**  
 30 **experience parenting a child who:**

31 **(A) Is a current or former consumer of mental health or addiction treatment; or**

32 **(B) Is facing or has faced difficulties in accessing education, health and wellness services**  
 33 **due to a mental health or behavioral health barrier.**

34 **(b) A “family support specialist” may be a peer wellness specialist or a peer support**  
 35 **specialist.**

36 [(8)] (9) “Global budget” means a total amount established prospectively by the Oregon Health  
 37 Authority to be paid to a coordinated care organization for the delivery of, management of, access  
 38 to and quality of the health care delivered to members of the coordinated care organization.

39 [(9)] (10) “Health insurance exchange” or “exchange” means an American Health Benefit Ex-  
 40 change described in 42 U.S.C. 18031, 18032, 18033 and 18041.

41 [(10)] (11) “Health services” means at least so much of each of the following as are funded by  
 42 the Legislative Assembly based upon the prioritized list of health services compiled by the Health  
 43 Evidence Review Commission under ORS 414.690:

44 (a) Services required by federal law to be included in the state’s medical assistance program in  
 45 order for the program to qualify for federal funds;

1 (b) Services provided by a physician as defined in ORS 677.010, a nurse practitioner certified  
 2 under ORS 678.375 or other licensed practitioner within the scope of the practitioner’s practice as

 19 in a patient centered primary care home or behavioral health home by licensed primary care  
 20 clinicians, behavioral health clinicians and other care team members, working together to address  
 21 one or more of the following:

22 (A) Mental illness.

23 (B) Substance use disorders.

24 (C) Health behaviors that contribute to chronic illness.

25 (D) Life stressors and crises.

26 (E) Developmental risks and conditions.

27 (F) Stress-related physical symptoms.

28 (G) Preventive care.

29 (H) Ineffective patterns of health care utilization.

30 (b) As used in this subsection, “other care team members” includes but is not limited to:

31 (A) Qualified mental health professionals or qualified mental health associates meeting require-  
 32 ments adopted by the Oregon Health Authority by rule;

33 (B) Peer wellness specialists;

34 (C) Peer support specialists;

35 (D) Community health workers who have completed a state-certified training program;

36 (E) Personal health navigators; or

37 (F) Other qualified individuals approved by the Oregon Health Authority.

1 directly to the recipient for the purchase of health services and for services described in ORS

3 [(15)] (16) “Medical assistance” includes any care or services for any individual who is a patient  
4 in a medical institution or any care or services for any individual who has attained 65 years of age  
5 or is under 22 years of age, and who is a patient in a private or public institution for mental dis-  
6 eases. Except as provided in ORS 411.439 and 411.447, “medical assistance” does not include care  
7 or services for a resident of a nonmedical public institution.

8 [(16)] (17) “Patient centered primary care home” means a health care team or clinic that is or-  
9 ganized in accordance with the standards established by the Oregon Health Authority under ORS  
10 414.655 and that incorporates the following core attributes:

- 11 (a) Access to care;
- 12 (b) Accountability to consumers and to the community;
- 13 (c) Comprehensive whole person care;
- 14 (d) Continuity of care;
- 15 (e) Coordination and integration of care; and
- 16 (f) Person and family centered care.

17 [(17)] (18) “Peer support specialist” means any of the following individuals **who meet quali-**  
18 **fication criteria adopted by the authority under ORS 414.665 and** who provide supportive ser-  
19 vices to a current or former consumer of mental health or addiction treatment:

20 (a) An individual who is a current or former consumer of mental health treatment; **or**

21 (b) An individual who is in recovery, as defined by the Oregon Health Authority by rule, from  
22 an addiction disorder.]; *or*]

23 [(c) *A family member of a current or former consumer of mental health or addiction treatment.*]

24 [(18)] (19) “Peer wellness specialist” means an individual **who meets qualification criteria**  
25 **adopted by the authority under ORS 414.665 and** who is responsible for assessing mental health  
26 and substance use disorder service and support needs of a member of a coordinated care organiza-  
27 tion through community outreach, assisting members with access to available services and re-  
28 sources, addressing barriers to services and providing education and information about available  
29 resources for individuals with mental health or substance use disorders in order to reduce stigma  
30 and discrimination toward consumers of mental health and substance use disorder services and to  
31 assist the member in creating and maintaining recovery, health and wellness.

32 [(19)] (20) “Person centered care” means care that:

- 33 (a) Reflects the individual patient’s strengths and preferences;
- 34 (b) Reflects the clinical needs of the patient as identified through an individualized assessment;  
35 and
- 36 (c) Is based upon the patient’s goals and will assist the patient in achieving the goals.

37 [(20)] (21) “Personal health navigator” means an individual **who meets qualification criteria**  
38 **adopted by the authority under ORS 414.665 and** who provides information, assistance, tools and  
39 support to enable a patient to make the best health care decisions in the patient’s particular cir-  
40 cumstances and in light of the patient’s needs, lifestyle, combination of conditions and desired out-  
41 comes.

42 [(21)] (22) “Prepaid managed care health services organization” means a managed dental care,  
43 mental health or chemical dependency organization that contracts with the authority under ORS  
44 414.654 or with a coordinated care organization on a prepaid capitated basis to provide health ser-  
45 vices to medical assistance recipients.

1        [(22)] **(23)** “Quality measure” means the measures and benchmarks identified by the authority  
 2 in accordance with ORS 414.638.

3        [(23)] **(24)** “Resources” has the meaning given that term in ORS 411.704. For eligibility purposes,

6        **(25)(a) “Youth support specialist” means an individual who meets qualification criteria**  
 7 **adopted by the authority under ORS 414.665 and who, based on a similar life experience,**  
 8 **provides supportive services to an individual who:**

9        **(A) Is not older than 30 years of age; and**

10        **(B)(i) Is a current or former consumer of mental health or addiction treatment; or**

11        **(ii) Is facing or has faced difficulties in accessing education, health and wellness services**  
 12 **due to a mental health or behavioral health barrier.**

13        **(b) A “youth support specialist” may be a peer wellness specialist or a peer support spe-**  
 14 **cialist.**

44 (25)(a) “Youth support specialist” means an individual who meets qualification criteria  
 45 adopted by the authority under ORS 414.665 and who, based on a similar life experience,

1 **provides supportive services to an individual who:**

2 **(A) Is not older than 30 years of age; and**

3 **(B)(i) Is a current or former consumer of mental health or addiction treatment; or**

4 **(ii) Is facing or has faced difficulties in accessing education, health and wellness services**  
 5 **due to a mental health or behavioral health barrier.**

6 **(b) A “youth support specialist” may be a peer wellness specialist or a peer support spe-**  
 7 **cialist.**

8 **SECTION 4.** ORS 414.635 is amended to read:

9 414.635. (1) The Oregon Health Authority shall adopt by rule safeguards for members enrolled  
 10 in coordinated care organizations that protect against underutilization of services and inappropriate  
 11 denials of services. In addition to any other consumer rights and responsibilities established by law,  
 12 each member:

13 (a) Must be encouraged to be an active partner in directing the member’s health care and ser-  
 14 vices and not a passive recipient of care.

15 (b) Must be educated about the coordinated care approach being used in the community and how

24 (e) Shall be encouraged to work with the member’s care team, including providers and commu-  
 25 nity resources appropriate to the member’s needs as a whole person.

26 (2) The authority shall establish and maintain an enrollment process for individuals who are  
 27 dually eligible for Medicare and Medicaid that promotes continuity of care and that allows the  
 28 member to disenroll from a coordinated care organization that fails to promptly provide adequate  
 29 services and:

30 (a) To enroll in another coordinated care organization of the member’s choice; or

31 (b) If another organization is not available, to receive Medicare-covered services on a fee-for-  
 32 service basis.

33 (3) Members and their providers and coordinated care organizations have the right to appeal
